

Land Conservation Strategy



We provide this annual update on the status of land conservation to support the goals of the South Florida Ecosystem Restoration Task Force in a most challenging economic climate.

The emphasis on land acquisition has changed at both the state and federal level. Comprehensive Everglades Restoration Plan land acquisition is over 60 percent complete and we are now transitioning to project construction. Reduced revenue has forced the State of Florida and the South Florida Water Management District to re-examine past acquisitions for opportunities to refine project boundaries and surplus lands acquired previously. There is no funding this year from the Florida legislature for the Florida Forever program and Congress is unlikely to fully fund the Land and Water Conservation Fund. County land acquisition programs have also been adversely impacted by the economic downturn.

The Land Acquisition Strategy was renamed the Land Conservation Strategy by the Task Force at the October 2010 meeting in recognition of the change in emphasis from fee simple acquisition to working with private landowners to achieve conservation goals and leverage limited funds. Many tools described in the Land Conservation Strategy can be used to achieve these goals, such as conservation easements, mitigation banks, dispersed water storage, and others.

Several new initiatives to acquire and protect lands have occurred since the last update. These include:

- The **Everglades Headwaters National Wildlife Refuge and Conservation Area** planning effort undertaken by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service .
- Acquisition of **26,800 acres in the Everglades Agricultural Area** by the South Florida Water Management District for restoration of the Central and Southern Everglades .
- Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission's **Cooperative Conservation Blueprint Regional Pilot Project** to support working lands and build wildlife corridors in the Northern Everglades and Southwest Florida .

The 2011 Land Conservation Strategy is now a web based document. The Strategy is available as both a PDF format and a web format. One of the goals of publishing the Strategy as a web-based document is to reach a wider audience and improve the usefulness of this tool for Everglades stakeholders.

Federal, state, and local governments are adapting to this new climate and continue to make progress on acquiring, conserving, and protecting lands needed for South Florida Ecosystem restoration. This summary highlights progress made from July 1, 2010 – June 30, 2011.
