**Get The Water Right**

Mike Ornella provided a Power Point Presentation (Enclosure 3) reviewing the Corps efforts in SW Florida. Tamiami Trail Culverts project with the SFWMD as the local sponsor underway, total cost is \$7,678,122. Phase I of the Southern Crew project is complete. Completion scheduled for December 2003 at a total cost of \$12,097,318. Design of the Lake Trafford project is 90% complete, total cost will be \$17,564,552 completion of construction expected for December 2004.

Southern Golden Gates Estates a \$137 million project was formerly a Critical Project. PMP approved and the PIR is being fast tracked to make WRDA 2002 submission. Completion targeted for 2006. C43 - Basin Storage Reservoir completion scheduled for September 2001. Construction schedule being re-viewed and the PIR on target for 2003. Design Agreement being coordinated for the Lakes Park Restoration, a Lee County sponsored project with a total cost of \$5,166,000. Design Agreement is also being coordinated on

the Henderson Creek/Belle Meade project, Florida DEP is the local sponsor and total project cost is \$4,805,000. Mike Ornella reported that workshops have been held and the yellow book has not yet been updated with the CERP implementation schedule. Corps to provide an executive summary of the Implementation Schedule to the Working Group at the next meeting.

## RECOVER

John Ogden presented the draft Partnership Agreement (Enclosure 4) for agencies participating on RECOVER. Document drafted by the RECOVER Team and reviewed by the District and the Corps is being brought before the Working Group for information only at this time.

Monitoring Assessment Plan – Frank Finch and COL May requested a formal response but only three agencies submitted formal comments. Technical comments will be reviewed and two or more workshops will be held to address those comments. Working Group member agencies asked to provide comments.

CERP Report Card – Process to create the annual report card is underway. Public workshop scheduled for June 6 at the Ft. Lauderdale Field Station.

## Minimum Flows and Levels/Assurances

Naomi Duerr briefed the Working Group on the current status of the MFLs rulemaking for the Water Conservation Areas. MFLs are being identified for five separate water bodies (Lake Okeechobee, Everglades, Caloosahatchee, Biscayne Aquifer and Lower West Coast Aquifers). The MFL Rule has been published in the Florida Administrative Weekly, comments were received and final public hearing held on April 17, 2001. Governing Board briefed in May 2001 and they are expected to consider adopting the Rule at the June 2001 meeting. The rules would then go into effect September 2001 barring any challenges. Starting to see some harm as the saltwater line moves up into the estuaries because of the drought. The environment is used to a regime and any excessive condition (flooding and drought) can be harmful. It is hoped that the natural hydroperiod situations will be mimicked as the minimum flows and levels are refined through the years. Ernie Barnett added the reservation issue, is a better example to get to natural cycles, it was envisioned that new water would be rainfall driven. He added that it is fundamental that as the PIRs are developed the natural system is restored first and foremost and the water related needs of the region are met.

## Programmatic Regulations

Stu Appelbaum presented a Power Point presentation (Enclosure 5a) and reviewed section 601 (h) of WRDA 2000 (Enclosure 5 b). Assurances broken into four parts:

1. Agreement between the President and the Governor (no specific date) but, construction funds cannot be allocated until there is an agreement.
2. Secretary of the Army has until December 2002 for promulgation of those Programmatic Regulations.
3. Project Specific Assurances
  - PIRs - quantifying the amount of water to be made available and reserved for the natural system.
  - PCAs – legal mechanism between the Corps and the non federal sponsor that must be signed prior to project construction.
  - Operating Manuals – manuals that are put forth how the project and features are operated, regulation schedules, features.
4. Savings Clause – not harming existing water users, maintaining flood protection as of the date of enactment of WRDA and rights of the Seminole Tribe with regards to the Compact between the Tribe and the SFWMD.

Legislation requires that a statement be received from the Governor and the Secretary of Interior either concurring or non-concurring with the Programmatic Regulations. If either of these two entities has a non concurrence, the statement must detail the reasons. If the statement is not received within the 180 days, then it is deemed that the requirements for concurrency are met. PIRs that are approved prior to the issuance of the Programmatic Regulations must be consistent with the Plan. The Preamble needs to include a statement concerning the consistency of those PIRs. These Programmatic Regulations need to be reviewed every five years. He reviewed the process and schedule (Enclosure c) for developing the Programmatic Regulations. The Working Group and Task Force will be briefed on a regular basis. An

outline of the Regulation will be developed by the end of July 2001. The target date for publishing of the Final Programmatic Regulations in the Federal Register is December 1, 2002. Stu Appelbaum noted that it will be hard to get through the process if there is no consensus. He reviewed the Draft Guiding Principles (Enclosure 5 d) dated May 15, 2001. The Programmatic Regulations will not establish specific quantities of water (which is the function of the PIRs) but rather establish processes. The requirement is that the PIR lays out the water to be captured by the Plan. PIR is the technical study that will get the answer. Maureen Finnerty said the critical component is the interim goals. She noted the Senate Report Language states the Federal and State partners should establish interim goals, restoration standards to provide a means by which the success of the plan could be evaluated. Stu Appelbaum stated he was aware of the Senate report language and noted there are divergent views on this. Rock Salt stated the interim goals begin to set the expectations and he hoped everyone would stay open on this issue. Interim goals would allow everyone to stay focused on what they expect from the plan. Fred Rapach stated he had no problem with establishing a process to establish a goal for the complete success of CERP. Stu Appelbaum reiterated there are divergent views and this issue needs to be worked on further.

### ASR Team Update

Richard Harvey reported the team met twice with participation from a lot of the same folks participating on the Project Development Team and a wider variety of participants is needed. Team is trying to reach consensus on what the Working Group expectations are as well as trying to identify those issues that may not be otherwise addressed. Team conducted a side by side comparison of the current Program Management Plans with the Issue Team Report and CROGEE Report recommendations. Team concluded it is comfortable with the direction of the PMPs with the exception of the regional science issues. It was recognized that the PMPs for the pilot projects were never intended to address ASR Regional Science types of questions. However, the SFWMD and the Corps have convened a new PDT to work on a Project Management Plan to address those regional science issues. Richard Harvey noted there was a lot of confusion during the Legislative session regarding EPA's attitude about the ASR process. He provided a Correspondence Package (Enclosure 6).

COL Rice asked about the purpose of the Legislation. Ernie Barnett clarified the state law was trying to set up a new regulatory program within the framework of the Clean Water Act that would allow DEP to have a state regulation that would regulate these programs that would be subject to EPA review and approval. The Bill had more monitoring and stringent requirements than the current UIC program requires. Although this was not required, decisions were made to codify it in statute. It was primarily unsuccessful because of fears that it was being implemented too broadly. Richard Harvey added this is a Section 120, Chapter 403 variance and under the current state laws they would be unable to grant a variance to a federally regulated program. Richard Harvey stated there is a lot of misinformation out there and it may be one of the primary purposes of this Issue Team to set the record straight. Rock Salt noted the CROGEE sent a letter to the editor disagreeing with an article in the Miami Herald which implied the CROGEE had taken a position on ASR. Rock Salt asked if members of the Issue Team had concerns with the way the Corps and the District are proceeding on ASR right now. Richard Harvey stated there are folks on the Issue Team that are concerned the PDT process is being run by the District and the Corps.

Fred Rapach presented the draft Charter (Enclosure 7) for a first reading. The team will go beyond looking at the project specific issues. The purpose of the team is to periodically review and monitor the progress and the direction of the CERP ASR Project Delivery Team looking at the pilot projects, regional study, and the resolution of those issues raised in the Issue Team and CROGEE reports. Team will provide status reports to the Working Group. **Action: WG asked to provide comments by June 1<sup>st</sup>, charter will be scheduled for approval at the July meeting.**

### Water Shortage Update

Naomi Duerr noted the year 2000 has been the second driest year on record. Driest areas have been the area north of Lake Okeechobee and southwest of Lake Okeechobee. It is projected that conditions will continue through to July and then improve, however, impacts will linger. The majority of the water supply comes from the wells, WCA's (secondary source) and Lake Okeechobee (backup or third source). Water levels for Biscayne aquifer dropping drastically and all WCAs are currently near or below "floor" elevations. Lake Okeechobee is at an all time low and is projected to continue dropping down to 7 feet. There has been significant impact to potable water supply for those cities that take their water directly out

of the lake. Agriculture, wading birds, navigation and recreation have also been impacted. The drought provided the opportunity to start some environmental enhancement projects (ie, planting of bulrush, native trees and the removal of organic berm) and the Lake Istokpoga drawdown project has been accelerated. Richard Harvey noted that if the drought continues into next year, the salt water intrusion in the Lower East Coast wellfield will be problematic. EPA is currently working with DEP to possibly use wastewater that is currently discharged into deep injection wells back into the canals to help prevent intrusion. This would require a federal delegated permit and the process is complicated and folks need to anticipate whether or not they will need it. Naomi stated that putting reclaimed water into the canals is one of the District's preferred options of implementing re-use.

Fred Rapach commented on the level of seriousness that is being discussed and ways to utilize existing water sources. He pointed out the Wacodahatchee Wetlands System, the L-30 canal, water that has been treated and gone through wetland the systems. An excess of 1- 2 million gallons of water could be available by using that system. In addition, the Palm Beach Aggregates Reservoir has billions of gallons of water available to be discharged into a Class I water body, yet DEP is reluctant to authorize that release. He urged those agencies involved to cooperate.

### Goal 3 Steering Committee Update

Linda Friar reported the team has met and has discussed how achievements will be measured and how appropriate targets will be defined for inclusion in the next Strategy document. Next team meeting is scheduled for May 24, 2001 at Rookery Bay.

### Land Acquisition Issue Team Update

Allyn Childress presented the Land Acquisition Plan Outline (Enclosure 8). The report will have three main sections: acquired lands; needed lands (active programs); and potential lands (those identified by the various agencies that have not gone through an official process) including CERP and non-CERP lands. An appendix with project sheets will also be developed with a summary matrix and map. A secondary appendix will reflect those lands under acquisition programs without a federal interest (financially). Sue Alsop stated the footprint for CERP projects will not be finalized until the PIR is done. She asked how the CERP lands would be identified. Allyn clarified the document will contain the information currently available. Joan Lawrence added this document will contain the best information available at the time and it would have to be updated.

### East Everglades Update

Allyn Childress presented the update (Enclosure 9) noting 1,300 additional acres have been acquired. Maureen Finnerty commended the Department of Justice for their help. Barbara Junge noted there has been a high settlement rate and another 100 cases have been settled.

### MSRP/MERIT Update

Dawn Jennings provided a Power Point presentation (Enclosure 10) the process for implementing the Recovery Plan. The Multi-Species Ecosystem Recovery Implementation Team has been established to develop an implementation schedule which is required by the ESA. Three subteams have been created to focus on specific issues (landscape, species/communities and conservation). The information developed from the subteams will enable the development of the overall strategy. MERIT has pulled together the Florida Panther Subteam to produce a landscape conservation plan for the Florida Panther.

### Florida Panther Presentation

Randy Kautz provided a status update of the work done to date by the Panther Subteam which was created in February 2000. Team has attempted to identify a primary zone of habitat for the Florida Panther which are those areas that are essential to the survival of the species. Secondary zones are those areas needed to support the primary zones. Findings identify forests as key panther habitat and two maps were developed and presented to the Working Group showing the primary and secondary zones as well as the landscape linkage. Maureen Finnerty requested the addition of Sonny Bass from ENP to the team.

### Biscayne Bay Partnership Initiative

Jim Murley noted the Partnership Initiative was created by the Florida Legislature in 1999 and funded by both the Legislature and the SFWMD. Policy Development Committee Report (Enclosure 11 a) and the

Survey Team Report (Enclosure 11 b) were submitted to the Legislature in January 2001. Currently \$6 million in the budget to implement the recommendations outlined in the report. The money will be administered by DEP and others, much of which will be used for land acquisition. The Management Team and Policy Team suggested the Working Group create a Biscayne Bay Watershed Team to continue to move this effort forward.

#### Biscayne Bay Watershed Team Directive

Allyn Childress presented the draft team directive (Enclosure 12) for a first reading. Deliverables include an Annual Update to track how this initiative helps move things along as well as an Action Plan. Membership will be different as recommended by the BBPI and will include representatives from the various user groups. John Folks noted there are protocols in place for dealing with non-governmental representatives serving on teams. Neal McAliley clarified that a specific finding is needed to have non-Working Group member representatives on a team. Brad Brown suggested Neal McAliley assist in revising this document so that it is consistent with the protocols. **Follow-up: Working Group asked to provide comments to Allyn by June 1<sup>st</sup> with approval scheduled for July meeting.**

#### Public Comment

April Gromnicki (Audubon of Florida) stated she hoped the Programmatic Regulations did the job they are intended to do. She added that interim goals are needed. She urged folks to start working on the agreement between the President and the Governor so that it will get done concurrently with the process. She also wished Sue Alspach and Steve Forsythe well and encouraged them both to join their local chapter of Audubon.

Brenda Lee Chalifour (self, Dania Beach and Save Our Shoreline, Inc.) stated the Everglades funding issues were not handled well and encouraged everyone to educate their Legislators. She announced that 22 acres are about to be lost due to the expansion of Ft. Lauderdale Airport. She also pointed to the severe beach erosion that is taking place and it is unacceptable to see bulldozers on the beach, she hoped DEP would address this issue.

Mike Richardson (First National Bank of Homestead) said he found it difficult to participate in the Biscayne Bay Initiative because of their meeting schedule. Encouraged everyone to review the two minority reports from the Marine Industry which are included in the BBPI reports. They state that they too felt outnumbered by the government organizations and found it difficult to participate because of the meeting schedule. He urged the Working Group to expand the representation by public sector since many others that will be impacted by what happens to Biscayne Bay.

Patti Webster stated the Florida Forever, while it is a state program, is about partnerships to better leverage money to accomplish mutual goals and has been negatively impacted by the Legislative decision this year. She suggested the Working Group send a resolution recommending the program be supported at its historic funding levels.

Rick Smith clarified that the funding level is the same and \$75 million was taken from unspent balances which had been carried over for several years with the understanding that the money is to be paid back the following year.

#### Welcome and Administrative Announcements

Meeting called to order at 9:00 AM. March meeting minutes approved as amended to reflect Richard Harvey was present on the second day.

#### SCT Update

Ronnie Best provided a University of Florida publication (Enclosure 13) and noted the excellent review of the Science Conference. John Ogden noted that one of the SCT priorities is to look at flows. SCT is concerned that what is known about the role of flow is not organized and presented in a way that is useful for use by those folks working on Modified Water Deliveries and Phase I projects of the CERP. An ad hoc team will be pulling together all that is known both physically and ecologically. It is hoped that the Project Teams will have all the necessary information on the role of flow to help influence the design of some of these projects. A draft report will be brought before the SCT and WG by the next meeting. Ronnie Best requested 1 ½ hours on the next agenda to discuss Biscayne Bay science issues. Sue Alspach suggested focusing on those issues that need resolution and those where the Working Group could help.

#### CROGEE

Brad Brown reported the group met in conjunction with the Florida Bay Symposium and had a joint discussion with Florida Bay Review Team. Team looked at CERP issues in Florida and this served as a first step. John Ogden added the CROGEE will be providing a second report on the environmental indicators used in south Florida.

#### Big Cypress Basin Science Plan

Gary Lytton provided an update (Enclosure 14) and described the multi year process to develop the Science Plan which will be updated every two years. Steering Committee included representatives from federal, state and local agencies as well as public and private interests (agricultural and private research interests). Boundary established extending from Estero Bay south to include Naples, Rookery Bay and Ten Thousand Islands into the Everglades. Plan identifies key priority science and information management needs for the region's research and land management community. The Committee identified a boundary for Big Cypress, conducted an inventory of over 200 region research and monitoring projects and planned and conducted a series of workshops. Sixty-three specific research and monitoring projects have been identified with cost estimates. It is hoped to have a Regional Science Coordinator since it was found that much progress was made when staff and resources were allocated. Next steps include briefing the SCT and asking them to peer review to the Science Plan before it is released. Ron Jones commended those who worked on this Plan and the input from the stakeholders is a good example of how it should be done.

**Follow-up: The group was asked to coordinate the projects list with the SCT who will be updating the Science Projects List in Volume II of the Strategy in July 2001.**

#### Executive Director's Report

Kevin Burger presented the Working Group Workplan, 2001 Meeting Calendar and Action Issues and Issue Team Tracking Charts (Enclosures 15 a, b, c and d). Bob Doren will provide a full update on the ongoing efforts with Newtt. Bob Doren will be meeting with the SCT to help coordinate the efforts on the Invasive Exotic Animals and continue the work done by Carole Goodyear. No Federal appointments have been made to date so the July Task Force meeting will be cancelled. The Groundbreaking Ceremony for the Melaleuca Quarantine Facility will be scheduled in July or August. Biennial Report is at the printer and copies will be provided at the July meeting. Those individuals requiring a large number of copies were asked to notify Kevin Burger.

#### SW Florida Update

Mike Savarese reported on the one-day workshop (Enclosure 16) held in SW Florida. The two primary objectives were to discuss the status and priority of restoration and management efforts within four sub-

regions and to develop a means by which restoration science and management could be coordinated. Facilitated discussions were held over the course of a day with over 100 participants. Four proposed efforts were discussed and a follow-on meeting as been scheduled for May 31, 2001. Kevin Burger stated the purpose of the regional forums was to evaluate whether or not the PCT process has worked and where it has not.

### Dispute Resolution Task Team

Joan Lawrence noted a small group of the team met on the 11th of May and a follow on meeting will be scheduled to reach consensus on the draft recommendations. An update will be scheduled for the July meeting.

### Legislative Update

Rick Smith provided an update (Enclosure 17) on the approximately \$51.5 million appropriated for South Florida Issues. The Everglades funding as approved and was controversial. \$75 million was taken out of unencumbered balances of Preservation 2000 funds. There were other water projects funded and the Governor's Office is still awaiting the budget from the Senate and the House. Senate Bill 1524 provides for expedited permits for CERP projects and requires SFWMD to report financial information to the Joint Legislative Committee on Everglades Oversight, removes the 2.5 square mile area from the northern Lakebelt boundary, accepts the Lake Belt Plan Implementation Committee Report and eliminates the Committee. Senate Bill 1468 (Florida Forever) revises the goals and performance measures for the Florida Forever Program which replaced the Preservation 2000 Program effective July 1, 2001. Those goals are intended to ensure that the existing projects under P2000 are completed with the intent of protecting habitat and providing better patterns of protection. ### Litigation Update

Neal McAliley provided an update:

- Litigation over Homestead Air Base pending in DC. The Air Force issued a Supplemental Record of Decision on the disposal of surplus property for mixed use development and not for redevelopment as a commercial airport. Two lawsuits filed by Dade County and HABDI and were consolidated. Court denied the motion for preliminary injunction a few weeks ago.
- US vs. SFWMD and DEP, original water quality case pending before Judge Hoeveler. Consent Decree entered into in 1992. A motion filed in 1995 to modify the consent the decree to extend the dates for compliance and to incorporate a bigger cleanup program. Judge Hoeveler granted the motion to amend the Consent Decree and has invited additional briefing on whether he should appoint a Special Master (technical advisor who may have quasi judicial powers to oversee governmental action with regards to the consent decree).
- Two lawsuits involving the Cape Sable Seaside Sparrow. First led by the NRDC alleging USACE has not done enough to protect sparrow. Second led by the Miccosukee Tribe alleging the USACE actions have gone too far and violated the law. Hearings have been held before a Federal Magistrate Judge in Miami and are awaiting a ruling.
- Wildlife Conservation Fund of America vs. Gail Norton is pending in the Middle District of Florida in Ft. Myers a challenge by off road vehicle interests who are challenging the Off Road Management Plan adopted by the Big Cypress Preserve.

### Water Resources Advisory Commission Update

Frank Finch presented the resolution (Enclosure 18) creating the Commission that will model themselves after the Governor's Commission for A Sustainable South Florida. Organizational meeting held and the second meeting has been scheduled for June 7, 2001 to develop a priority issue list and workplan. Membership is comprised of a diverse group who can speak for their respective organizations. This is an opportunity to address and reconcile some of the issues. Fred Rapach recommended the Working Group look at developing a means to communicate with this newly formed Commission. Richard Harvey there will be opportunity for interaction. Terry Rice suggested figuring out how this body could serve as an advisory body similar to the Governor's Commission.

### Museum of Discovery and Science

Ron Smola presented the Outreach Plan, History and Participant List (Enclosures 19 a, b and c). Plan divided into three phases with Phase I intended to update the museum's existing environmental education

efforts. Phase II will renovate and enhance the existing Florida eco-scapes exhibits and Phase III will create a Florida Environmental Education Center. Requests have been sent to Working Group members to provide funding for this effort.

#### Outreach and Public Participation Committee

Thaddeus Hamilton stated a meeting will be scheduled prior to the next meeting. He asked the Working Group members to review the SFCURP package provided at the last meeting.

#### Public Comment

None

Steve Forsythe thanked the Working Group for their gift and the social held in his honor.

Sue Alspach asked the Working Group to move forward with the Biscayne Bay Watershed Team. She noted the South Dade Wetlands Project which is a 50,000 acre tract of land that has been on acquisition lists for many years. Funding is currently on hold since it is not clear whether it is in the CERP project footprint. Similarly there may be many other projects that may be affected by CERP. She suggested the Working Group possibly establish an Issue Team to address these other projects that may fall by the wayside.
